Work goes forth at AMSSM. Already, Chris Madden, MD and the 2006 Program Committee have been busy at work planning next years' meeting in Miami Beach. Speakers are being contacted, and ideas for new and exciting lectures are circulating. In response to your valuable comments on our previous meeting in Austin, we are endeavoring to do more of what you like, and less of what you don't like. Sounds simple, but keep in mind, we are a diverse group and by no means of one mind when it comes to likes and dislikes. Because of its enthusiastic reception, we will again offer the High School Team Physician Workshop for Florida area physicians, incoming Fellows and Primary Care Residents in training. Congratulations to Vito Perriello, MD for his fine work in putting together an outstanding committee.

AMSSM could not perform its mission without the hard work of our committees. I would like to update our membership on some of the activities in the works.

Dave Cosca, MD and his Internet Committee have been busy working on a new look for our webpage. With the help of a professional web page designer and the talent of our own Michele Lane from the home office, you can expect to see many changes in our web page design. Our hope is to make it easier for the membership to navigate through the site and to offer easier access to those features you find valuable. In addition, we want to expand our public site with features that our patients and other web surfers will find useful.

Jim Moeller, MD and the Education Committee continue to refine and develop the Case Poster and Case Presentation submission process to insure that all worthy cases are accepted for viewing by our membership. The opportunity for our Fellows to present at our annual meeting is a key request by our Fellowship Directors. Additionally, the [Clinical Journal of Sports Medicine](#) has agreed to publish those cases presented at the meeting providing an opportunity for our young presenters to have a publication in a peer reviewed sports medicine journal. The Education Committee is moving forward on collecting information on

sports medicine elective opportunities for medical students and residents in training from AMSSM members in private practice and at academic institutions. Finally, the Education Committee is participating in liaison with the Association of American Medical Colleges Musculoskeletal Education Advisory Panel task force to develop curriculums for teaching of musculoskeletal examinations.

Chris Madden, MD chairs the Economic Committee. Plans are in the pipeline for a pre-conference Sports Medicine Billing and Coding session at our Annual Meeting in Miami. This course has been a popular workshop item at our Annual Meeting for the previous two years and we expect to expand the content in a pre-conference format. The Economics Committee is also going to survey the membership with a Practice Survey that will address items of practice economics, reimbursement issues, and other valuable data that we can use in negotiation with providers and employers.

Mark Lavalley, MD and the Fellowship Committee remain quite active. The Fellowship Fandango, held prior to our last Annual Meeting was a huge hit and will be continued this year. In response to suggestions from the committee, we will provide an opportunity for Residents attending our Annual Meeting to meet together with members of our organization in a social setting to answer questions about AMSSM, our fellowships, and a future in sports medicine. One problem that continues to surface from the Fellowship Committee is the difficulty in getting information from all our Fellowship Programs. I would encourage all Fellowship Directors to contact Mark if you have not done so recently in order to obtain the information we need to provide the best resource for fellowship candidates.

Our International Committee is headed by Steve Simons, MD. The International Committee is our main vehicle for contact with our sister organizations in Canada, the United Kingdom, and Australia. We would like to expand this contact to Europe. For those of you who heard Markus Walther, MD at our Annual Meeting last year, you realize the sports world is much larger than our own backyard. I had the wonderful opportunity to attend the 1st International Conference on the Prevention of Sports Injury in Norway this summer. 550 attendees and 55 countries were represented at this conference. The scope and excellence of the research presented was truly amazing and makes me excited about possible collaboration with sports medicine physicians around the world. As such, I have appointed the International Committee to spearhead our participation in the Rendezvous Meeting to be held in 2008 in San Francisco.

Our Membership Committee is chaired by Kim Harmon, MD. We currently have 981 members in AMSSM. We are the largest Primary Sports Medicine Society that I am aware of. There are some who think that bigger is not always better, but in our case, I believe it is. While most of our membership has Family Practice backgrounds, we continue to gain membership in Pediatrics,

Internal Medicine, Emergency Medicine, and Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation. Diversity in our practice makes for a stronger organization. We are continuing to evaluate membership criteria, reduced rates for resident members, and the economic value of membership in AMSSM.

Publications Committee is headed by our First Vice President, Paul Stricker, MD with a steady helping hand from Fran O'Connor, MD. Fran has been instrumental in developing a forthcoming series of articles in American Family Physician developed and written by members of AMSSM. Our organization will receive prominent recognition in the AFP Journal for our contribution. Work continues on other cooperative publications and we can expect papers on "The Role of the Medical Physician in the Training Room", "Mononucleosis" and "On the Field Return to Play Decisions".

Our flagship journal remains the Clinical Journal of Sports Medicine. Doug McKeag, MD remains an Associate Editor from AMSSM. Recently, we signed a contract with CJSM that extends our relationship for an additional 3 years. For 2006, we were successful in negotiating a reduced rate for CJSM Online. Accordingly, every member of AMSSM will receive the Online version of the CJSM as a member benefit. Those who wish an additional hardpaper journal copy will pay \$97. CJSM has also agreed to publish our research abstracts and case studies and provide an Annual Meeting supplement for our members. CJSM has pledged an annual \$5,000 unrestricted grant to our Annual Meeting and \$5,000 towards International Speakers to be shared by our sister organizations at the Rendezvous Meeting. We continue to provide online subscription for our membership to The British Journal of Sports Medicine and Sports Discus. BJSM has asked that we select a member of our organization to their Editorial Board and I have appointed Bert Fields to this position. Additionally, BJSM has asked us to provide a monthly case report for inclusion in the journal that will prominently display AMSSM members as the authors.

The Research Committee is chaired by John DiFiori, MD. Besides orchestrating the task of reviewing and selecting research presentations for our Annual Meeting, the committee under the leadership of Matt Gammons, MD, has submitted a request to survey our membership on strategies for increasing research submissions. Our agreement with CJSM to have our research presentations published annually makes our Annual Meeting an attractive venue to present research. Our Fellowship Research Workshop held this summer in Ann Arbor, Michigan under the direction of Bob Kiningham, MD was our largest to date. Positive reports from our Fellows in attendance underscores the importance of this conference in stimulating research interest.

Susan Joy, MD co-chairs the Diversity Committee with Bunmi Beckley, MD. The Diversity Committee is responsible for selection of the Resident Scholarship Award, monitoring member demographics and content of the annual program. Next year's meeting will include a highlighted section on the Disabled Athlete. Additionally, the Diversity Committee is developing programming ideas for medical student outreach, high school outreach and mentoring programs emphasizing sports medicine rotations, teaching, and career advancement.

The Public Relations Committee under the leadership of Katherine Dec, MD, continues their task of getting our organization in front of the public eye. We have had a successful beginning with Beginnertriathlete.com and a good experience with Real Simple magazine. One of the Public Relations Committee's biggest project was to establish hyperlinking between AMSSM and the Sports Medicine Fellowship programs. Once again, we have ex-

perienced difficulty in having fellowships cooperate with our efforts and I would again encourage any fellowship that has not contacted the Public Relations Committee to please do so. Finally, we have had preliminary contacts with a group wishing to use AMSSM talent in developing a syndicated children's television program on exercise. More on this later.

As you can see, we are a vibrant organization with many dedicated, hard working individuals. I cannot begin to convey to our membership the level of effort that goes into making AMSSM the success that it is. Perhaps, the most encouraging sign of our health that I can measure is the great number of members that are contributing to the committee work. As in baseball, the public loves the home run hitters. But games, and organizations, are won by the individuals who advance the runner, steal a base, lay down a bunt, turn the double play, hit the cut off man, and do the middle relief. To those who toil in those tasks, I salute you.

The AMSSM Diversity Committee has been busy in past months on formulation of the specific committee goals for the 2005 year. Old Business

- AMSSM Board voted not to participate with a dues reciprocity agreement with International Sports Medicine Organizations.
- AMSSM will seek funding from Lippincott Williams & Wilkins for an annual International exchange lecture. This request will accompany other AMSSM support from Lippincott Williams & Wilkins.
- International applicants to AMSSM may be eligible for membership via AMSSM Bylaws provisions. The International Committee recommended that international membership applications should first be reviewed by the International Committee. The committee shall then make recommendations to the Board of Directors.

New Business

- Rendezvous 2008: The International Committee recommended to the Board of Directors that our Annual Meeting location for 2007 be altered to a non-west coast location to accommodate a west coast location and participation with Rendezvous 2008 Meeting.
- The International Committee members will assist CASM or other organizations with administrative support or planning for the Rendezvous 2008 Meeting.
- Consider approaching ACSM to suggest AMSSM members have representation for the International Team Physician Course.
- Identify international sports medicine physicians or scientists traveling or temporarily living in the U.S. as a source for Annual Meeting speakers.
 - Goal: Travel cost reduction.
 - Membership to inform AMSSM Program Committee and International Committee of such opportunities.
- Reach out to Mexico Sports Medicine Organizations as a source of interchange.
- Dr. Markus Walther, MD was well received and appreciated at the 2005 Annual Meeting. He serves on the Sports Medicine Board of Directors for all German speaking countries in Europe. In 2005, he will be the international traveling scholar for the American Orthopedic Foot and Ankle Society. He also enjoyed our meeting and was quite attentive through the entire meeting. He would like to repeat an appearance at AMSSM meetings every 2-3 years.

A Member in the Spotlight

Rob Cabry

Our member in the spotlight this month is from the East Coast. Robert Cabry, MD was born and bred a Pennsylvanian; specifically he is from Delaware County, just outside of Philadelphia. His education included a B.S. in Biology at St. Joseph's (in Philadelphia), Medical School at Thomas Jefferson, Residency and Fellowship at Crozer-Keystone Medical Center. Like some other AMSSM members, Rob served time in the military, was in the Navy, as an Undersea Medical officer. In addition to providing medical care, Rob, a certified diver, assisted his unit in the salvage operations. His unit was one of those that responded to the TWA crash off of New York.

Rob's present practice is in an Orthopedic group, Upland Orthopedics, in Upland, Pennsylvania. His practice consists of outpatient orthopedics, sports physicals, as well as, developing a kid's fitness program. In 2006, his practice will be starting "Kids Strong"; a fitness program for non-athletic kids, including diabetics, asthmatics and obese youth. The program will focus on nutritional education and journaling and regular organized aerobics at their facility.

In addition to his practice, Rob loves covering sporting events. If he could not do this part of the job; he might have considered another career. Rob says he'd choose to be a veterinarian, because of his love for animals. As far as sporting event coverage, Rob has focused on the coverage of boxing. He works with the Pennsylvania Athletic Commission and volunteers his time to do physicals and cover events for amateur boxers. In addition to covering 2 amateur events a month, he also covers professional boxing events around 6 times a year.

Like many sports medicine doctors, Rob enjoys being physically active. He took up cycling 3 years ago in addition to running, golfing and fishing. In September, Rob will participate in a 150-mile bike ride for MS. The ride will start in Cherry Hill, New Jersey and goes to Ocean City and back.

Rob is married to Kim, a Dermatologist. They have 2 daughters, ages 10 and 5, and a son, age 7. At least twice weekly, the family does fitness related activities together, such as going to the local fitness center in the winter and swimming or playing soccer in the warmer months.
